| Alexander Wadsworth Eaton, one of the most highly esteemed citizens of East Washington, died at an early hour this morning at his residence, 1240 3d street southeast, after a long and severe illness. He was born in the Washington navy yard the 16th of August, 1838, and was the son of the late David Eaton, boatswain, United States navy. | | | |
| During the war between the states Alexander Eaton volunteered from the District in the three months' service and received an honorable discharge. Later on he was identified with the board of public work under Governor Shepherd, and was also a prominent contractor during that period. During the last twenty years of his life he was inspector of wood for the Anacostia and Eastern district. | | | |
| In private life his character was that of an upright, honorable and charitable gentleman. He was a member of Dawson Lodge, No. 16, F.A.A.M.; of Washington Naval Chapter, No. 6, R.A.M., and of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. He was also a charter member of Syracusian Lodge, No. 10, Knights of Pythias, and a member of the Veteran Volunteer Firemen's Association, having been a member of the old Anacostia Fire Company. | | | |

| Interment was made in Congressional Cemetery, where the remains of his wife and two daughters also lie. | | | |
| Arrangements for the funeral were in charge of Sergeant-at-Arms Randell and Lieutenants Hammond and James, of the Capitol police. Nine civil war veterans who had served with him for a time on the Capitol police force, acted as an escort to the body. They were Lieut. John Hammond, Sergeants G.W. Hazer, John O'Connell, D.R. Nichols, Officers J.W. Burne, A.T. Hodge, Blackford, William P. Hall, and J.A. Burrow. | | | |

At the last meeting of Logan Regiment, held at the armory, 719 Sixth street northwest, with Col. M.F. Carey in command, the following motion was unanimously carried:

"Taps have again sounded from across the Great Divide, and the reaper who gathers without respect of persons has entered our hall.

Our comrade, Lieut. Col. Alonzo J. Eaton, has responded to the summons that comes to all. His life work has been ended, and a character full of tenderness and of loving kindness to all has ceased to exist, leaving his name to be added to the honored and sacred roll of patriotic dead.

"At the outbreak of the great war Comrado Eaton joined Company G, Fifteenth Maine Infantry, and served faithfully as a gallant soldier until the end, when he received an honorable discharge for work well performed.

"Since the war his life has been passed in this city, where he enjoyed the friendship and esteem of all who knew him.

"That he was royally welcomed by brave comrades, who have passed over before him, there can be no doubt, while we, his earthly comrades, are left to cherish his memory and remember that life is but a brittle thread that may be broken without a moment's warning, therefore, we should be prepared that when the Master calls us home we may be ready, like him, to depart in peace.

"To his bereaved family we tend our deepest sympathy, commending them to the care of Him who doeth all things well.

"Further resolved, That the charter be draped for thirty days."

*The Navy Yard Section During the Life of the Rev. William Ryland
Columbia Historical Society, Volume 4*

This gentleman was a boatswain in the Navy and his residence was inside of the Navy Yard. He was a man of very independent and energetic character--so much so, indeed, that it stood in the way of his advancement to a higher position. He entered the naval service in 1795, was appointed boatswain in 1811, and served in the Navy throughout the whole of the War of 1812. He was with Captain James Lawrence on the sloop of war *Hornet* when she captured the British ship *Peacock*; was on the same vessel under Captain James Biddle when she took the British ship *Penguin*; and helped materially in the escape of Biddle's vessel when she was pursued by the enemy's frigate *Cornwallis*, a ship carrying over four times the number of men and guns carried by the *Hornet*. Among the descendants of Mr. Eaton are Alexander W. Eaton, his son, and George G. Eaton, his grandson, the latter a member of the Columbia Historical Society. Mr. Eaton was stationed at the Washington Navy Yard from 1820 until his death.

Death of Mrs. E.L Eaton

Mrs. Elizabeth L. Eaton died, after an illness of five weeks, at Providence Hospital, Thursday night. Mrs. Eaton was the wife of Capt. Alonzo J. Eaton, an employee of the United States Senate, and was born in Brunswick, Me., and resided in Boston a number of years, but she has been a resident of the District during the twenty years last past. She had many friends, and it was greatly through her energetic efforts as a member of the Anacostia Citizens' Association, it is said, that the bill granting the franchise for an electric line from the navy yard to Congress Heights was passed, the property of the Eatons being along that line and adjoining the asylum grounds.

Mrs. Eaton was prominently identified with the Knights of Labor during its prosperous times and did a great deal toward bettering the condition of her sex through getting them better pay and their elevation in other respects. She was charitably disposed and was ever ready to assist the worthy poor, and during the distressing times of the last Potomac floods she was instrumental, through her connection with the Knights of Labor, in raising a large amount of money and securing donations of provisions and clothing for their relief. Prior to eight years ago, Mrs. Eaton was for a number of years, employed as translator in the botanical division of the Agricultural Department. Her remains will be buried in the Congressional cemetery, the funeral services taking place at Lee's undertaking establishment Monday afternoon, 15th instant, at 2 o'clock.

Funeral from his late residence, No. 734 7th street southeast, Monday afternoon, September 3 at 3 o'clock.</p> <p><i>The Evening Star, September 1, 1906, p. 2</i> <i>Death Came Suddenly</i> <i>Henry True Eaton Succumbs to Heart Disease</i></p> <p>While performing some specially fine masonry work at the navy yard yesterday afternoon, Henry True Eaton, sixty-eight years old, a prominent resident of the city, living at 734 7th street southeast, dropped dead. A surgeon from the Marine Hospital was summoned, but he found life extinct when he arrived. Coroner Nevitt had investigated the circumstances attending the death and the body was removed to the rooms of a local undertaker to be prepared for burial. The funeral will be held from his late residence, 734 7th street southeast, Monday at 3 o'clock p.m., with interment in Congressional cemetery.</p> <p>Mr. Eaton had been complaining of feeling ill for a couple of months past and had done no work in that time, being retired from business. Yesterday, however, he was summoned to the navy yard to do some work on a new building there which required expert skill, and he answered the summons. Shortly before 3 o'clock, as stated, he suddenly collapsed. Fellow-workmen went immediately to his assistance, but they were too late. Death was declared to be due to heart disease.</p> <p>For many years Mr. Eaton was a prominent business man in Southeast Washington and owned considerable property in that section of the city. He was born on August 8, 1838, and came to this city when he was a mere boy. He engaged in the grocery and liquor business for twenty-five years, having his store at 734 7th street southeast, where he lived. About eight years ago he determined to give up the cares of business and retire. Since that time, however, he had been active as a builder and contractor. He continued in that business up to about two months ago.</p> <p>Mr. Eaton enlisted in the Union army during the civil war and served with credit to himself for several years. He was a member of the G.A.R. and was also a member of the Builders' Union.</p> <p>Besides his wife, Mrs. Ann Rebecca Eaton, six children, three boys -- Henry T. jr., George and Clarence Eaton, and three daughters -- Cornna E., Anna and Lillian Eaton, survive him.</p> <p><i>The Evening Star, September 3, 1906, p. 16</i> <i>Funeral of Henry Eaton</i> <i>Services Held This Afternoon at Late Home of Deceased</i></p> <p>Funeral services over the remains of Henry True Eaton, who died suddenly Friday afternoon while at work at the navy yard, were held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at the late residence of the deceased, 734 7th street southeast.
