The funeral of the late Mrs. Matilda Bache Emory took place from St. John's Church at 10 'clock this morning and was largely attended. The lamented lady, who was such a conspicuous figure in Washington society for so many years was the great granddaughter of Benjamin Franklin, granddaughter of Alexander J. Dallas, Secretary of the Treasury and Secretary of War, 1814-1816 and niece of Vice President George M. Dallas, who was at one time minister to the court of St. James. She was also the sister of the distinguished savant, Prof. Alexander Dallas Bache.

<i>Miss Emory, Prominent In Society Circles, Dies</i>			
Miss Sarah Tilghman Emory, 83, socially prominent native of Washington, died yesterday in her apartment at 1213 Seventeenth street N.W. She had been an invalid for a number of years.			
Family friends said yesterday, Miss Emory and her sister, Miss Victoria de M. Emory, her only surviving close relative, were descendants of Benjamin Franklin.			
Miss Emory was the daughter of Maj. Gen. Hemsley Emory. Her early life was spent on Army posts with her father. Later she came to live permanently in Washington and made her home for a time at 1713 H street N.W. She was a sister of the late Rear Admiral William H. Emory.			
Miss Emory was a member of the congregation of St. John's Church and took a particular interest in the work of the church orphanage.			
Funeral services will be held at St. John's at 2 p.m. tomorrow. Burial will follow in Congressional Cemetery.

<i>Victoria Emroy Dies; Franklin Descendent</i>			
Miss Victoria de M. Emroy, 82, died yesterday at the Home for Incurables, 3720 Upton street N.W., where she had lived since the death of her sister, Sarah Franklin Emory, in 1940.			
Paul E. Johnson, family attorney, said Miss Emory was the oldest direct descendant of Benjamin Franklin through her mother, Mrs. Matilda Bache Emory.			
Miss Emory was the daughter of Gen. William Hemsley Emory, Civil War commander of the 19th Corps and head of the Military Department of Washington from 1869 to 1871. Her early life was spent on Army posts.			

She later made her home at 1718 H street N.W. She was the sister of the late Rear Admiral William Hemsley Emory, who commanded the Bear on the Greely relief expedition in 1884.

She was a member of St. John's Episcopal Church, Sixteenth and H street, N.W., where funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. tomorrow. Burial will be in Congressional Cemetery.

Miss Emory is survived by several nieces and nephews including Capt. Dallas Emory, U.S.N.

*Gen. Emory's Funeral*

The late Gen. Wm. H. Emory was buried yesterday at 2 o'clock with military honors. The funeral services were read at St. John's church by Rev. Dr. Leonard, assisted by Rev. Mr. Pine, and were listened to by Secretaries Whitney and Dandicott, Senators Chandler and Evarts, and a number of other public men. The honorary pallbearers were Admiral Porter, Rear Admirals Worden, Rogers, and Howell, Pay-Director Watmough, and Ex-Secretary Robeson from the Navy, and Lieut. Gen. Sheridan, Bvt. Maj. Gens. Augur, Brice, Rucker, and Greely, and Gen. J.R. Johnston. The military escort consisted of the 3d artillery and band, from the Barracks, under Col. Gibson, and the 4th and 6th cavalry, from Fort Myer. This is the first occasion on which the cavalry companies have paraded here, and they attracted universal attention by their fine appearance. A long line of carriages, containing the relatives and friends of the late general, escorted the body to Congressional Cemetery. Among the attendants at the funeral were a committee from the Society of the Nineteenth Army Corps, which held a meeting in New York city Saturday afternoon and passed resolutions of sympathy

in regard to the death of Gen. Emory, who was the president of the society and commandant of the corps during the war.

General Kearny's Expedition to California, 1846-47, being engaged in the Combat of San Pasqual, Dec. 6, 1846, Skirmish at San Bernardo, Dec. 7, 1846, Passage of the San Gabriel River, Jan. 8, 1847, Skirmish on the Plains of Mesa, Jan. 9, 1847, and as Lieut. Colonel, Regiment of Maryland and District of Columbia Volunteers, 1847-48; as Astronomer for the demarcation of the Boundary Line between California and Mexico, 1848-53; as Commissioner and Astronomer to run the Boundary, under the Gadsden Treaty of Dec. 30, 1853, between the United States and Mexico, 1854-57; on frontier duty at Ft. Riley, Kan.,

1857-58, during Kansas Border Disturbances, Utah Expedition, 1858, Ft. Arbuckle, I.T., 1858-59, Scouting, 1859, and Ft. Cobb, I.T., 1859; on leave of absence, 1859-60; as Member of a Board to "revise the Programme of Instruction at the Military Academy," Jan. 12 to April 24, 1860; and on tour of inspection in the Department of the Pacific, 1860-61. Resigned, May 9, 1861.
