She is survived by four children, Mr. Charles McBlair, Andrew Jackson McBlair, Mrs. Virginia Gadsby Smith and Miss Julia TenEyck McBlair. The deceased was born in Baltimore and was the daughter of John Gadsby, once proprietor of what is now known as the National Hotel. The funeral will take place Wednesday from St. Paul's Church, 23d street, and the interment will be in Congressional cemetery.
